



Kenji Tsutsumi is a Professor of Section of Human Geography, Graduate School of Letters, Osaka University (Dr. Lit.). He is a socio-economic geographer, and his main research fields are depopulation, regional change, regional planning, regional social capital, and theory of spatial peripheralization. He often visits to mountainous villages, islands, ex-coal mining regions and even a locally decaying places in big cities. He is a two-posts-professor at his school. He was one of the first teachers of the Erasmus Mundus in his school. Every year since 2013 he has been awarded for an excellent professor by his faculty. Also he is now a Professor for the Programs for the Leading Graduate Schools, established and sponsored by the National Ministry of Education, Culture, Sports, Sciences and Technology, “Cross Boundary Innovation Program” in Osaka University. He has been also awarded by Osaka University twice, and has got some other awards from academic or educational associations. He has been a representative of two main academic associations of geography in Japan. In 2014 he was chosen for a contributor of the International Encyclopedia of Geography, edited by the Association of American Geographers and Wiley. Also he has been selected for a member of the advisory board of the Global Conference on Economic Geography 2018 (Cologne, Germany). In addition he is a representative of a junior sports club and instructs one of the Japanese martial arts, Giwakempo (having a black belt of the 6th grade).
